**2. Email** us an electronic version from fnqces.org and pay by Direct Deposit. Bank details are on the Application form.

Accounts are available to anyone residing in **Far** North Queensland.

You may join FNQ Community Exchange as an individual, family, household, business or community group.

Only signed Applications will be accepted.

### Fees

Initial Fee: \$20 per application.

Annual Account Keeping Levy: 12 Bartles (payable each September for Users joining prior to July of same year).

# STATISTICS

FNQ CES / Tableland LETS Users have traded approximately **106000 Bartles** during the past 12 months. An average of 11 trades per day are recorded by TBCE Users on the Community Exchange.

We are still the most active Community Exchange group in Australia We have deleted a large number of inactive accounts during 2018.



# Admin Report

### Hello!

Bel attended an inspiring Regen Ag event at Petals at Tolga recently. She was invited to talk about the Community Exchange System for about an hour, and ran a workshop where we demonstrated the simplicity and importance of what we do.

Before, during and after the workshop Bel was able to share a little of our history, the unique successes of FNQ CES, the few challenges, the awesome stats, and a few stories about real people and real differences LETS / CES has made in their lives. There were a few local LETS folk present, as well as active DVNS and CENT members. It was really helpful to have their input.

The main part of Bel's presentation consisted of a large circle where each person had a turn to introduce themselves, say what their "usual" profession or income-earning activity was, share what else they can do to earn wealth (Bartles), and what they'd ideally like to spend those Bartles on.

It was evident that just within that circle there were many "matches" of Offerings and Wants. Before the activity, no one was aware of these needs or skills/goods existing within the group. That demonstrated how CES works. Without participation in Community Exchange, we don't always know what opportunities exist within our community to give or receive energy (help/labour/services), excess produce, unwanted items, etc. Without the process of thinking about earning or spending Bartles (to maintain our goal zero balance), we aren't often aware of our own worth, our own desires, outside the "every day".

Maria said, "It was a great presentation you gave Bel and I really enjoyed the circle sharing.... SO much potential around us!"

Thank you to those who participated. This activity can be done at any event (such as a trade day), which we often used to do and call it Circle Time. Of course, if you have an account, you can login to <u>www.communityexchange.net.au</u> and

add/update your Offerings and Wants at any time. Let us know if you need any help.



We also had a presence at the Small Farms Field Day in Malanda in November. A few people signed up to trade in FNQ Community Exchange, and several more were interested. Thanks to those of you who came along to the Sustainability Tent to support Bel and share your LETS experiences.

The 12B annual levy from each account was delayed due to the decline in health of our admin helper Alison recently. We are catching up on the tasks Ali did for us, and should have processed the levies by the time this newsletter is published.

Simon from BrisLETS asked, "Bel, I'm fascinated how FNQld LETS works - it's so active. I'd love to learn more - what's the secret!? I've been plugging away here for two years and we're still pretty small. Another thing I'm curious about is how anonymously things seems to be done up there - your website and newsletter don't say who does what. It's so different here."

Our informal admin structure means that it's not always clear who does what. Katrin and Bel can both access all accounts and admin info, handle emails and new accounts, levies and stipends, and share promotional tasks, calendars, managing some events etc. Bel prepares the newsletter, but has help with content from contributors, and with formatting from Cate (and Starr also helped with this one). We have a small amount of money to manage - the \$20 collected for new accounts is spent on postage, the PO Box fee, event expenses, web hosting, domain names etc. Sheila manages the money, with Katrin & Bel operating petty cash accounts for small costs which are checked and recorded by Sheila. She also checks and records our bank statements and receipts. As well as these admin tasks, we have our Local Area Contacts who keep on top of local enquiries, holding some printed forms etc and discussing any admin issues with us. Overall, it doesn't take a lot of effort to keep FNQ CES running - it's the Users who are trading and recording, and the event hosts, drop off points and area contacts who are all complimenting the admin work Bel, Katrin & Sheila share. Thank you all, for all you do!

- Be clear with prices and terms
- Say up front if you are expecting part \$ payment
- LETS is as good as the relationships within; respect and kindness will help
- If you are happy with an experience leave a recommendation for the trader
- Speak up straight away if you are not happy with a trade

If ever you feel uncomfortable about a trading arrangement please talk to admin.

We encourage you either drop any excess bags you have into the Donations section of the Jaz Bagz box outside SPAR supermarket, or leave them at any LETS DOP with "Jaz Bagz Malanda" pinned to them somehow, and we'll make sure they get circulating! No use hoarding excess shopping bags in your cupboard or car boot - get them out there to be used!

#### LET'S SHARE MUGS -LET'S SHARE PLATES



To make reusable mugs and plates, bowls and cutlery available for LETS events, other community events and private functions -- we have been creating "LET'S SHARE" boxes to be stored at DOPs and other central locations for FNQ CES folk to hire by donation.

We are looking for plastic storage boxes in good condition (no broken parts) with lids that seal for our LET'S SHARE MUGS and LET'S SHARE PLATES boxes. We are also looking for mugs without stains & chips, metal teaspoons, knives, forks & spoons, and **melamine** (a type of hard plastic) plates and bowls in good clean condition. We are willing to pay Bartles for these items.

The first "LET'S SHARE" boxes are at the Atherton Drop Off Point, clearly labelled and under a table. Please check with us before removing boxes, and please return promptly, in clean & dry condition. There is also cutlery available.

Our intention is to lessen the use of disposable crockery & cutlery all across FNQ.

Admin also have 3 folding tables and an urn to hire. Contact Katrin or Irene for availability.

### LET'S RECYCLE

There are many ways FNQ CES enables items to be reused and recycled, as well as lessening consumption of new items. Before buying new, many Users place a Want on Community Exchange - for household needs, garden items, clothing, baby items, building materials, gifts and so much more! It is amazing what is accessed through Community Exchange.



We also enable re-use of jars, wine bottles and other containers through some Drop Off Points or individuals' Wants. This is much more environmentally sound than popping them into your recycling bin (where, sadly, they may still end up in landfill or undergo energy-hungry processes to be recycled).

Some members are collecting the 10c return-for-deposit recyclables by donation or for a 0.07B per item payment. This enables you to participate in this new scheme without having to go to a collection point.

There are often green gifts and household items available through LETS - shopping bags, beeswax wraps, recycled timber items, home-propagated plants in reused pots, local saved seeds in handmade packets, unwanted/unused/gently-used "everything", craft materials,

handmade cards and gift tags. Check out LETS before you buy new. And place Wants if you have a little time to wait for your item to appear for Bartles! Using CES is much easier than hunting the op shops and trawling the markets in search of your desired goods.

Hiring of cups, plates, bowls, cutlery, tables and an urn for events is another way CES is helping reduce consumption in FNQ. See previous News item for more information.

## **OCTOPI GARDEN UPDATE from Chelsey**



My partner Pat and I are about to realise a long-held dream in taking on the management of a space in which community connection, wholistic health and creative endeavour intertwine in Queensland's highest town.

Many of you would know of the Octopi Garden, a modest cafe/ larder/ healing space located in Ravenshoe, FNQ. Created 5 years ago by Vanessa Barkley and Hayley Buchanan, the Octopi has nurtured all that walk through the door to discover the treasures within: local, organic produce, hand made items, real food made with love, healing therapies, workshops and events and the chance to connect with other like minded folk.

Part of our future vision for the Octopi is to provide access to food and stock through the LETS system. Initially, we have invited local Tablelands LETS members to sell their wares at our Thank You and Welcome event in December and we will be offering drinks for bartles when we host our first LETS trade day in January. From these small steps we will work towards increasing the range of items available for bartles, including offering a standing selection of food and drink off our menu, therapies, workshops and venue hire.

The possibilities for trading are endless, and for us the choice to combine cash flow with a regular stream of bartles flowing in and out is an empowering action that reaps both practical and social benefits ts for us and our community.

# **FNQ Community Exchange User Agreement**

- 1 Far North Queensland Community Exchange was formerly known as Tableland LETS. It is an informal non-profit group managed by its users. FNQ Community Exchange provides a service which allows Users to exchange information to facilitate trading and maintain such records of that trading.
- 2 A local Bartle is the symbol of energy transferred between users. Users shall be willing to trade in Bartles. It is essential that with part Bartle, part cash transactions, the ratio is 50/50 (or more Bartles than dollars). The value of a Bartle shall be decided upon between parties to any individual transaction. Users may know the Bartle balance of any other User including administrative accounts.
- 3 FNQ Community Exchange Admin is authorised to levy charges on Users' accounts in Bartles at a rate determined in August each year. This is currently 12B/annum.
- 4 FNQ Community Exchange Admin may decline a transaction or User it considers inappropriate.
- 5 Accountability of taxes incurred by Users is the obligation of those involved in an exchange. FNQ Community Exchange has no obligation, nor liability to report to the Australian Taxation Office, nor to collect taxes on their behalf.
- 6 No warranty or undertaking as to the value, condition or quality of the items or services exchanged is expressed or implied by the virtue of introduction of Users to one another.
- 7 While all information on Users' accounts is considered personal and confidential, and only accessible by registered Community Exchange System (CES) Users, FNQ Community Exchange cannot guarantee confidentiality nor be held liable for breach of it. It is a User's responsibility to ensure and protect all Users' details by ensuring account and password details remain confidential and Offers and Wants emails are not forwarded to those who are not registered CES Users.
- 8 All transactions between Users are the sole responsibility of those Users and no liability to the Users of any nature shall be incurred by FNQ Community Exchange or any other User or Admin in respect of such a transaction.
- 9 No one, including any member of the FNQ Community Exchange Facebook Group or CES account holder shall administer or create a Facebook group or page, web page or other online location or email list associated with or in the name of FNQ Community Exchange or Tableland LETS for any purpose, including trading in Bartles without approval of FNQ Community Exchange Admin.
- 10 These terms and conditions may be changed by FNQ Community Exchange Admin from time to time. Changes will be published in Bartle Banter and updated online.
